HISTORY OF EARTH DAY

The first ever celebrated Earth Day was in 1970 when a senator from Wisconsin, Gaylord Nelson had witnessed the effects of an oil spill in Santa Barbara, CA. Senator Gaylord used national media to advertise an informal lecture on the topic and organized a number of Earth Day events across the country.

Over 20 million Americans took to the streets and demonstrated against the effects of the industrial revolution on the environment. When the 90's came around, Earth Day went global, mobilizing over 140 countries to join the efforts and today, Earth Day is widely recognized. Although climate issues are still on the horizon, there's much more awareness around the topic and efforts going into correcting the problem - the biggest societal undertaking of our time.

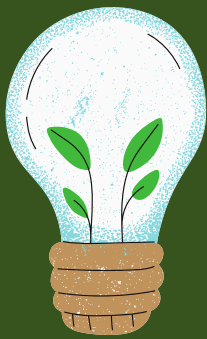




INVEST IN OUR PLANET

EARTH DAY IN UCLUELET

Did you know, 80% of marine debris originates on land, and litter lining our streets very rapidly blows or runs-off into the ocean? Surfrider Pacific Rim uses the data collected at annual clean-up events as an indication of what litter items are most prevalent in our communities, informing their campaigns and programs to eradicate marine pollution at the source.

On Friday, **April 22**, Surfrider will be around town doing an Earth Day cleanup and they want your help!

Bring your own bucket, gloves and garbage picking tools to give back to your community and mother earth! Refuse drop-off stations will be situated at the Seaplane Base Rec Hall, the Village Green and Relic Surf Shop at the junction on **April 22** from **10AM - 2PM**.

On April 22 & 23, tidy up your space, inside and out! Refuse bins will be provided at the Seaplane Base Rec Hall for proper disposal. Please, no household waste or recycling. Do you have items you want to get rid of? Drop-off or pick-up gently used items under the tents at the Rec Hall. Come and check out our re-purpose program! One persons trash is another persons treasure!

Surfrider will engage volunteers in waste diversion education where we learn proper waste management to keep recyclable goods out of the landfill and into a re-usable cycle.

FACTS

- Every year, Canadians throw away **3 million tonnes** of plastic waste, only **9%** of which is recycled, meaning the vast majority of plastics end up in landfills and about **29,000 tonnes** finds its way into our natural environment.
- In Canada, up to **15 billion** plastic bags are used every year and close to 57 million straws are used daily.
